**1.0 SPORT: ARCHERY**

**2.0 HOST CLUB LOCATION: WHITECAP DAKOTA FIRST NATION**

**3.0 DATES: JULY 27-29, 2022**

**4.0 PSO: SASKATCHEWAN ARCHERY ASSOCIATION, INC. (SAA)**

**5.0 NUMBER OF COMPETITORS PER TEAM**

**5.0 Each Tribal Council / Team is allowed only four (4) athletes in each division (2 male & 2 female)**

**Compound (17U & 15U - 2 male & 2 female)**

**Traditional (17U & 15U - 2 male & 2 female)**

**5.0** An Athlete may only shoot in one division and not both

**5.1** Coaches will consist of 1 male & 1 female. Teams may share coaches where needed.

**5.2** Alternates. 1 male and 1 female athlete may be listed as alternates for each age category. Should the placement of the alternate become necessary due to injury, illness or absenteeism the team has until the commencement of the games to slot in the alternate. The maximum number of players that will be eligible to be registered participants of the games, issued accreditation and compete shall not exceed 2 male and 2 female athletes per age category.

**5.3** Each Tribal/ Grand Council must have a minimum of one female coach and a minimum of one male coach. Managers may be of either gender.

**6.0 CLASSIFICATION**

Class is fixed by your age on December 31st, year of games.

**7.0 ELIGIBILITY**

**7.1** The Saskatchewan First Nation Summer Games shall be open to Saskatchewan Residents who are of Status Indian Ancestry. Athlete treaty numbers are required as proof.

**7.2** All athletes must play with their respective Tribal/ Grand Council teams they are a member of.

**7.3** All athletes must be a member of a First Nation within the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nation.

**7.4** Transfer of Status Indians to another Tribal/Grand Council is allowed as per Saskatchewan First Nation Winter and Summer Technical Manual RESIDENCY clause.

## 8.0 PROVINCIAL REGISTRATION

### 8.1 ATHLETE and TEAM REGISTRATIONS SAA Membership for athletes:

**NOTE:** For insurance purposes, all athletes, coaches and managers must be registered members of the **Saskatchewan Archery Association**, prior to participation in order to protect liability for the SAA affiliate club hosting the event. In the case that the alternate athletes attend the competition, they will be covered under the guest policies as outlined on page 18 of the SAA policies and procedures. #### 8.1.2 Athlete Competition Registration:

**NOTE:** Competition fees are set by the host club and will align with the SAA's provincial competition fees. Competition fees will be **paid by FSIN** directly to the host club.

#### Competition fees are:

**Athletes:** Informed by the Host Club but will align with the set SAA competition fees.

**Coaches/Managers:** no charge

#### Instruction:

1. Complete the Team Competition Registration form (link is included in technical package) and submit along with payment to the **FSIN SCYR Department**.

2. FSIN to forward Athlete lists and competition fees to the host club prior to **June 24, 2022**.
3. Each team is required to complete the attached registration forms. This registration form is to be submitted to the **FSIN SCYR Department** no later than **June 24, 2022**.

## 8.2 COACH CERTIFICATION

Any staff listed as a coach on the official registration must have completed the Aboriginal Coaching and Officials Program (ACOP) offered by the Coaches Association of Saskatchewan.

## 8.3 PAYMENT OF REGISTRATION

Each Tribal/Grand Council is responsible to send completed SAA membership registration forms and payment directly to **Saskatchewan Archery Association**.

Payment SAA membership fees must be issued on ONE Cheque per Tribal/Grand Council.

Each Tribal/ Grand Council is responsible to send completed Team registration forms and payment directly to **FSIN**.

Payment Team registration fees must be issued on ONE Cheque per Tribal/ Grand Council.

**Payment and registration are due to the FSIN & Saskatchewan Archery Association no later than June 24, 2022.**

Athlete competition fees to be paid to the host club no later than **June 24, 2022**.

FSIN to forward copy of Team Registration and competition fees directly to **host club**. There will be no refunds of competition fees. Alternate substitutions will be allowed up to **June 24, 2022**.

## 9.0 COMPETITION

- Practice on the course is not permitted. Practice butts will be supplied by the Host Committee on site. Coaches, Chaperones and Parents are not permitted on the field of competition. Any of this happening during competition shall result in a disqualification.
- All athletes will shoot 2 rounds of 20, 3D targets at varying distances.
- A shooting group of archers (4-5) will be determined by the host committee.
- All athletes shooting the Traditional Bow or Re-curve Bow unsighted will shoot at varying distances (1-30 yards)
- All athletes shooting Compound Bow will shoot at varying distances (U17-1-50 yards, U15- 1-40)
- Equipment shall be checked before the match and shall not be altered during competition.
- The event will be double scored.
- Each target is numbered at the shooting position. (AC23.1) Each athlete shall shoot and stand or kneel at the shooting peg without compromising safety. (AC23.1.2) In 3D rounds the athlete can stand or kneel up to approximately 1M in any direction beside or when the athlete is shooting alone at a peg and no safety concern is caused, behind the shooting peg, taking into

consideration the condition of the terrain. In exceptional circumstances a judge may give permission to shoot from outside of the defined area.

- Under no circumstances may an arrow be re-shot.
- There is to be no discussion of distances among the athletes of a group until the target has been scored.
- There shall be no discussion between athletes, coaches, managers about distances, angles or other assistive information until the daily competition is complete.
- Equipment failures must be visible and agreed upon by the majority of the group. Upon agreement, the shooter must have his/her scorecards initialed by the entire group as an equipment failure. The scorecards of the shooter with the equipment failure will be totaled and initialed by the score keepers before leaving the range. At that time, the shooter (with the failure) only must proceed forward through the course to the range tent and notify a Range Official.
- The Range Official will hold the individual's scorecards until the repair is completed and he/she is escorted back onto the range. The Range Official will determine the amount of time necessary to make the needed repair. The time element will not be abused. A Range Official must escort all persons re-entering the range to the designated target.
- If there are three or more shooters remaining in the group they may continue shooting. If two or less shooters remain, they must join the following group (unless by joining the following group it will make a group of 6 or more) or step aside and await a range Official before continuing.
- After each end, the competitors walk to the target (which they share). An arrow earns the score of the zone it lands in. They are as follows:

**AC 27.2.0** For 3D Rounds, the scoring is as follows (ref. WA9.2.2)

- small circle centred within the ten rings. Approximately 25% of the ten rings will be used.
- the large circle inside vital area.
- vital area outside the 10-point circle.
- remaindering body colour zone of the animal.

**AC 27.2.0.5 0 (Miss)** - a hit in the horn/antler, hoof or background, not touching body colour or any other miss or glance off. *AC Note: a "glance-off" occurs when an arrow hits the edge of a target, but does not remain in the target, nor is a pass through (defined 23.8.6.1). The target may be damaged or marked, but the hole is not surrounded by target material as in a pass-through.*

**AC 27.2.1.1** Targets must be **scored** by both scorekeepers **before arrows are pulled**.

**AC 27.2.1.2** In the case of an athlete pulling arrows before they are recorded by the scorekeepers: If the arrow belongs to the archer pulling the arrow, it will score a Miss (0) on that target;

If the arrow does not belong to the competitor pulling arrows, the arrow will score according to the majority decision of the group,

**AC 27.2.4.1** Also applies for witnessed **pass-through and bounce-outs** for Canadian 3D. If the majority of the group cannot agree on the value of a witnessed pass-through or bounce-out before the archers advance to the target, the arrow shall not be considered to have been shot.

- In case of a disagreement on the placement of the arrow, the Range Officer settles the dispute. The protest is brought forward by the coach or manager of the team.
- If the arrow is pulled before the tabulation, the person who pulls the arrow receives a zero for that target. The score cards have to be legible, completed in black or blue ink and signed by the scorer and the archer. If the tabulated scores do not match, the lesser value will be recorded as the official points.
- If an arrow lands in the dividing line it earns the higher value. A deflected arrow is scored where it lands.
- Witnessed pass-through arrows are to be scored as agreed on by the majority of the group or a re-shot before shooters advance to the target. An arrow embedded in another arrow scores the same as the first. A re-shot is not warranted.
- When two archers or more have identical total scores, the process of tie breaking is as follows: a shoot off will be held using a 3D animal target set as an unknown yardage, with an X placed in the center of the highest scoring area. The arrow closest to the center of the X will determine the winner. If only one shooter is present at the shoot off, he or she will be declared the winner.
- Shooting stakes shall be designated at the site.
- Field glasses (binoculars), telescopes and other optical aids may be used for spotting arrows provided they do not represent any obstacle to other athletes at the shooting peg.
- Prescription spectacles, shooting spectacles, and sunglasses may be used. None of these may be fitted with micro hole in lenses, or similar devices, nor may they be marked in any way that can assist in aiming.
- The spectacle glass of the non-sighting eye may be fully covered or taped, or an eye patch may be used.

**RULE VIOLATION:**

- Any person in violation with FCA rules will be disqualified from the event.
- Any shooter, who disobeys shoot officials' orders, will be disqualified from the event.
- Littering or improper disposal of trash will be considered as un-sportsmanlike conduct and could result in disqualification.
- If an individual is late they may start only where their group is at and will receive "0" (zeros) for the targets already shot by the group.

**10.0 SCORING**

The event will be doubled scored.

After each end, the competitors walk to the target (which they share). An arrow earns the score of the zone it lands in. They are as follows: 1) Eleven X (11 X) for the smallest ring, ten (10) points for the inner ring, eight (8) points for the outer ring, five (5) points for a body hit and zero (0) points for a hit in the hoof or horn, not touching body color, any other miss or glance off. 2) In case of a disagreement on the placement of the arrow, the range officer settles the dispute. The protest is brought forward by the coach or manager of the team.

## **11.0 PROTEST PROCEDURE**

### **11.1 Sport Protests**

The Archery Canada Rule Book will apply for protests. Protests must be made to the head referee and he or she can consult with umpires, FSIN, and the tournament chairperson to make a decision. Protests are allowed on rules application only, which will follow the rules of Archery Canada. A Sport Jury will consist of head official, FSIN, and a Saskatchewan Archery Association representative.

### **11.2 Eligibility Protests**

The FSIN Sport, Culture, Youth and Recreation Board will act as the Jury for all protests dealing with the eligibility of Athletes. All protests must be communicated to the FSIN Games Coordinator no later than 15 minutes after the end of the competition.

Protests must be signed by the Team Sport Contact/ Chef-de-Mission or his/her mission staff designate of the participating team. This designate must be submitted in writing.

All protests will be accepted with no explanation from the Board. All protests must be dealt with within 15 minutes of the game or competition ending or game stands as posted.

A fee of \$500.00 will be in place for all protests. This fee will be given directly to the FSIN Games Coordinator. Cash will be the only accepted form of payment. This fee will be put toward the Youth Championships if the protest is lost. Protest fee will be returned if the protest is won by the Team protesting.

## **12.0 EQUIPMENT/ COMPETITIVE UNIFORM**

### **12.1 Equipment**

- Bows and arrows will be the responsibility of the athlete.
- Targets and storage bin will be the responsibility of the host committee.
- All equipment will be stored daily by the host committee, no exceptions.
- Matching team uniforms must be worn at all times.

#### **Traditional:**

- A recurve or long bow with no sighting device.
- A rest and plunger are all that may reside within the site window.
- Stabilizers are not permitted.
- There will be no markings on the bow or on the bow string that could be considered as site marks.
- There will not be any type of draw check on the bow or the string.
- Bow must be shot with glove, finger tab or bare fingers.
- While shooting, the archer shall touch the arrow with the index finger against the nock, and use a single anchor point.
- The arrow shall be of the same material and of uniform length and weight, with the archer's initials on the shaft by the nock.

**Compound:**

- Which may be of a shoot-through type riser
- Draw is mechanically varied by a system of pulleys or cams.
- Bow is braced for use by cables or bowstring(s) attached directly to the cams, the string nocks of the bow limbs, cables or by other means as may be applicable to the design.
- No equipment may be electric or electronic.
- The peak draw weight shall not exceed 60lbs.
- A riser brace or split cables are permitted, provided they do not consistently touch the athlete's hand, wrist or bow arm
- A bowstring of any type which may include multiple serving/s to accommodate nocking points and include other attachments such as a lip or nose mark, a peep-hole, a peep-hole "hold-in-line" device, D loop bowstring, string silencers, bowstring weights, etc. are permitted.
- Draw check indicators, may be used provided they are not electric or electronic.
- A bow sight attached to the bow.
- Bow sights may allow for windage and elevation and may also incorporate a levelling device, and/or magnifying lenses and/or prisms.
- The sight points may be fibre optic
- On unmarked rounds no part of the sight may be modified for the purpose of providing means for range finding.
- Athletes may carry their sight marks on the course, meaning a single point of reference for each specific distance. Multiple marks for use as a possible ranging guide are not allowed.
- A release aid may be used provided it is not attached in any way to the bow. Any type of finger protection may be used.
- The arrow shall be of the same material and of uniform length and weight, with the archers' initials on the shaft by the nock.

**12.2 Competitive Uniform**

- All athletes must wear their Tribal/ Grand Council shirts with the Tribal/Grand Council logo or team name clearly displayed on their shirt. (Track suits are acceptable)
- Athletes must wear appropriate shorts such as Russell Athletics Shorts. Jeans and cut-off jeans will not be accepted nor will long style board shorts or swim shorts.



### 12.3 Uniform Colors

Teams shall select appropriate walk on and competition uniforms adhering to the color schemes approved by the FSIN SCYR Board. The approved color schemes are as follows:

STC	Navy blue – red, gold and white trim

TATC	Navy – red and white trim
Woodland	Forest green – grey, white and black trim
YTC	Teal/black – grey/white and black trim

The host club will provide club level judges for the event.
